Welcome Joe Fairclough WB2JKJ

Joe Fairclough created the only ham radio curriculum for school use recognized by the New York City Board of Education. Joe is a native New Yorker (actually born in Brooklyn, but lived in Queens) who graduated from Richmond Hill High School in Queens and received his bachelor's degree from Long Island University. He celebrates his 40th year as a ham at SEAPAC.

Joe taught English for the NYC schools. In his search for motivators for his students he decided Ham Radio was just the ticket. Joe built the curriculum around communications and found his students eager to come to school and excited about what they were learning.

Today, Joe heads the not-for-profit organization created to encourage the use of Ham Radio in the schools. Known as the "22 CREW," The Radio Club of Junior High School 22 is known across the nation for its efforts. Joe has been recognized personally for his efforts in numerous ways. He was the ARRL Teacher of the Year, Dayton Hamvention "Ham of the Year," and was honored by Paul Parton, Governor of Kentucky, as an Honorary Kentucky Colonel.

The "22 CREW" is celebrating its 22nd Anniversary this year. You can join the "22 CREW" any day on the Classroom Net: 7.238 MHz from 1100 - 1230 UTC and 21.395 MHz from 1300 - 1900 UTC.

You will be entertained and challenged by Joe's presentation.

Greg earned his first license in 1955. In the mid-60s, he operated W7AGQ/4 from Virginia and served as a staff attorney with the FCC Broadcast Bureau in Washington, DC. He returned to the Northwest in 1967, where he served as a Judge for Washington County Circuit Court, Washington County, Oregon from 1969 until retirement. Greg serves as ARRL Northwestern Division Director, is a member of QCWA, DXCC, FARS, Willamette Valley DX Club and OTVARC (past President and Trustee).

He is a leader in the Boy Scouts of America and holds the rank of Eagle Scout. When Robbin reached the sixth grade he joined Troop 162 and got involved in

his community through service projects organized by the Troop. Over the years he worked as a volunteer for various Boy Scout camps, eg, Meriweather and Ireland. He earned his Eagle rank at seventeen years of age and continued to serve his Troop and community until he reached the age of eighteen, at which point he assumed adult Scouting leadership roles.

It was in training for the 2001 National Jamboree at Washington DC that Robbin met Phil Westover WA7URV, Scoutmaster for Robbin's Jamboree Troop. Phil is an Extra Class operator from Tigard, Oregon. Phil suggested that the leaders get Ham Radio licenses so that communication at the Jamboree campout would be easier. To that end several youth from the Jamboree Troop studied and took the Technician Class license exam. It was at this time that Robbin first licensed.

Robbin arrived home even more interested in ham radio joined OTVARC to see what else was available. Randy Stimson KZ7T introduced him to public service volunteer activities. Robbin is working toward his General Class License and preparing to serve at "Reach the Beach" and "Cycle Oregon" events as a Ham Radio communicator.






