

Banquet Program

The Life and Times of E. E. "Van" Van Valkenberg Former Chief Communicator of Air Force One

Our banquet program will be a presentation by "Van" Van Valkenberg showing slides of his career in the military and as airborne communicator for presidents. Van made a similar presentation at the 1989 SeaPac Banquet.

Van served 11 months in the latter part of World War II, 21 months in Korea, and was involved in the Cuban missile crisis. He was with the 19th air force on the Santo Domingo uprising and also served 27 months in Viet Nam.

Van was then transferred to Washington DC to Andrews Air Force Base where he flew the "VIP" Fleet, flying Secretary of State, Secretary of Treasury, Secretary of Agriculture and many other Foreign dignitaries. Van was then chosen as the "Chief Communicator of Air Force One". He then flew 6 Presidents, Vice Presidents, heads of foreign countries, and many plane loads of movie stars. He has flown into almost every country in the world including 53 times into Russia and 27 times into China. He's even gone into Entebbe, Uganda for lunch. Van made all the sneaky trips with Kissinger and all the flights with Haig during the Falklands conflict.

In his spare time Van is a sky diver with 2,041 free falls, 9 of which were from 40,000 feet with the "HALO" Teams.

After his presentation Van will answer questions from the audience.

Master of Ceremonies Greg Milnes, W7OZ ARRL Northwest Division Director aka "The Wiz"

Greg was first licensed in 1955. In the mid-60s, he operated W7AGQ/4 from Virginia and was a staff attorney with the Broadcast Bureau of the FCC in Washington, DC. He returned to 7-land in 1967. Greg became a Judge in 1969 and recently retired as Circuit Court Judge for Washington County, Oregon.

Greg is ARRL Northwest Division Director, a member of QCWA, DXCC, FARS, Willamette Valley DX Club and OTVARC (past President and Trustee).

Jack, a 1999 graduate of McMinnville High School, was first licensed in 1994 and has been an active ham ever since. He was awarded his Extra Class license in 1995.

Jack is a past Vice President of the McMinnville Amateur Radio Club, and has been an avid participant in their transmitter hunting activities. He has pursued his interest in Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ARDF) much further, representing the United States in ARDF world championship competitions in Japan and

Hungary. You'll see him on page 29 of the May 1999 QST, running across the finish line of the 80 meter competition in Hungary.

Jack stays active with ARES and was instrumental in setting up amateur radio communications at the Yamhill County Emergency Operations Center and managed operations at that station during the storms of '95 and '96. This, plus his other work as a cadet commander with the Yamhill County Sheriffs office has earned him a position of respect and trust in the department.

He is extremely active in public service activities, being a certified Rescue Diver, Marine Cadet on boater safety patrol, permanent team leader for Yamhill County search & rescue, and a cadet commander in the Civil Air Patrol. He has also taught computer classes, set up computer networks for the school district, and taught several Amateur Radio classes. He is employed by the Yamhill Education Service District as a technician in Electronic Services.

Jack has earned recognition for his strong academic standing, receiving several academic awards and being named to the National Honor Society. He will major in Biology at Oregon State University in the fall, where he plans to learn a lot about DNA fingerprinting. He looks forward to a career in law enforcement, and has his sights set on working in a forensics laboratory.



This year's seminar program is one of the best ever, with a wide variety of topics for the beginner as well as the advanced amateur.

On Friday there is a technical session on antennas by Marshall Johnson, KK7CW. Since ARRL did not sponsor a workshop this year, we decided to put on a program by a well-known ham from our own area.

Our seminar program is divided into "topic tracks". They are:

TECHNICAL: 11 seminars, No. 1, 3, 4, 7, 8, 14, 16, 18, 22, 27, and 28, on various subjects.

DIGITAL: 4 talks: No. 6, 11, 17, and 19, dealing with packet, HF digital, and APRS.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS: 6 talks: No. 9, 20, 24, 26, 29, and 31.

Topics include non-emergency Public Service, the use of APRS for public service, the State Packet net, the relationship between hams and the agencies we serve, and preparing for Y2K and earthquakes!

BEGINNERS: 5 seminars: No. 2, 10, 12, 21, and 25, dealing with antennas, propagation, construction (repeated Sun AM), and one especially for those who would like to learn more about the hobby before getting more involved.

ORGANIZATIONAL & GENERAL INTEREST: 5 seminars: No. 5, 13, 15, 23, and 30. Topics include the ARRL Forum, several about the good ol' days of vacuum tubes (flame FETs to you modern hams), and a couple of DXpeditions.

Note that several of our Saturday afternoon sessions are long, running from 2 until 5 PM or so.

With the Internet exploding, the need for Home Networking is obvious. The computer/telecomm industry "big guns" want to network computers in your home using existing phone and power lines. Most of these new systems are notorious RF noise sources and are susceptible to RF interference.

(4) "RF Safety: The New Rules and Health [T] Dr. Wayne Overbeck N6NB, Professor of Communications, California State University, Fullerton SAT 9:30 AM SEASIDE A

This presentation is about the FCC's new RF safety rules - and why they were adopted - by a former communications attorney familiar with the history and politics of this public health issue. (See http://commfaculty. fullerton.edu/woverbeck/N6NB.HTM).


